English Learner Department News

What happens in English Learner Support classes?

You may have noticed that on our class schedule we have a day set aside for our English Learners. Have you ever wondered why? What do they do on that day? Why do we set it aside just for them?

The third day of all of our English classes is our Designated English Language Development day. This time is protected time, just for English Learners, and it's federally mandated. This means that this day isn't something that we should just disregard as non-essential. This is the day that our English Learners get intensive assistance with topics and skills that are proven to help accelerate their English Language development.

One of the areas that we focus on is content area vocabulary. Each subject area has its own set of vocabulary. Math, Science, History, and English all have terms that you may not hear outside of the study of those subjects. It's essential that our students know that vocabulary to be successful in those subjects. We work on this together in class. (You can support your student from home with this vocabulary by using programs like Quizlet.)

Another area of focus is writing. Writing is consistently one of the weakest areas for students. We look at word roots, how words work together in sentences, and how sentences work together in essays. (You can work with your student's writing by using My Access or Quill.)

Another activity that our students do in class, which is essential to their continued success in both school and their life outside of school, is academic conversations. Students talk to one another and their teacher about what they have read or what they are writing. This is one reason why headsets are essential for English Learners. We need our students talking and listening to one another. (For extra listening practice, try working with the free resources on Listenwise.)
