Englisher Learners Department News

One of the amazing things about living in California is the diversity that surrounds us. Everywhere you go, you are greeted by a variety of cultures, ethnicities, and languages. This is so normal for us, that we quite often take it for granted. We know we will hear other languages, see other forms of dress, and have encounters with those whose traditions may be quite different from ours.

All public schools in California stress and encourage English language development. As teachers we study it, teach it, and assess it. We know that a child's best chance of academic success is to acquire proficiency in reading, writing, and speaking the English language.

While we want your child to excel in their acquisition of English, we also want to encourage you not to lose your home language! The best gift that you can give to your child is the gift of being truly bilingual. Studies show that students with strong literacy skills in their home language have a better chance of developing literacy in their second language.

A great way to foster this dual literacy in your children is reading! Read stories to your young children in both languages. Encourage your older children to read on their own in both their native language and in English. You may fear that your older child has already lost some of their native language. If this is the case, chat with your Education Specialist about adding a foreign language program, like Rosetta Stone, to your child's personalized education path. Biliteracy is coming to be seen as a prized possession here in California. The State Board of Education has even developed a seal that your child can earn and have affixed to their diploma. According to CDE Website, "The State Seal of Biliteracy, marked by a gold seal on the diploma or transcript, recognizes high school graduates who have attained a high level of proficiency in speaking, reading, and writing one or more languages in addition to English."
